"Whilst watching the news together at the outset of the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic in Britain, my eight year old daughter told me that this was "the fault of Chinese people". I asked if she knew what racism and discrimination were, and she said that she didn't. As she is learning from home and schools are currently closed, I decided to create this short activity for her. We have turned it into a quick resource as it might be helpful for others in these unprecedented times. I felt that it was a useful activity to help my own daughter understand discrimination and the impact that it has on others."

Introduction

Since the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic began, there have been unpleasant things said about different groups of people. Some have attitudes towards other people which are not very nice. You might even have heard some things like this yourself.

By completing this activity, you will have a better understanding of what is meant by the word **discrimination** and the impact that it can have on different groups of people.

- I am learning about what discrimination is and how it can impact on others
- I am learning about different types of discrimination and unfair treatment
- I am learning about what I can do to challenge discrimination


Success Criteria:


- I can explain what the word discrimination means and how it impacts on others

- I can give an example of someone from history who has challenged discrimination

Step One: Watch the Videos!

The first part of the project is to watch the videos below. Each of them discuss different types of discrimination. As you are watching, think about what is happening in the videos and take some notes about any new things that you have learned.

Step Two: Questions & Summary!

Now that you have finished watching the videos, the next step is to answer the questions below. You can write your answers on a piece of paper or in your notepad, or type them on your computer or tablet.



Tip: think about what you learned from the videos!

- 1. What is discrimination?
- 2. What is racism?

3. What other reasons are there for why some people might be discriminated against or treated unfairly?

4. How do you think it would feel to be the person who is being discriminated against?

5. What do you think stops some people from challenging unfair treatment of others?

6. What do you think we can do to stop racism and discrimination?

When you have answered the questions, write a short summary about what you have learned. Add something you could do to challenge discrimination and unfair treatment of others if you see it. Who can you share this with? Then you are finished. Well done!
